The Fundamentals

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In addition, there is the method you embrace to interpret all Scripture, not just prophetic passages.

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We will look at this issue first.

How to Understand Scripture

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In other words, how would the people who received the letter to the Romans have understood it within their historical and cultural setting.

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Jonah, Creation Account, Israel, etc.

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So, taking the best from these methods, scholars came up with the Grammatical-Historical Method of Interpretation.

Let's define this method:

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This approach assumes that the Bible is a product of its time and culture, and that understanding the historical context in which it was written is essential to understanding its meaning.

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In other words, we want to know, for example, what the words of Jesus meant to the people He spoke them to when He spoke them, and not necessarily how we would interpret them today.

Because Scripture has only one meaning, but it has many applications.

And in interpreting Scripture, especially prophecy, we need to determine the one, true meaning of the words before we can focus on the application to our times.

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And this can only be done through the grammatical
(according to the rules of grammar), historical
(consistent with the historical setting of the passage),
contextual (in accord with its context)
method of interpretation.

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But before we jump in, let's look at a few tips to help us read and understand prophecy, especially the prophecy found in the book of Revelation.

Tips for Understanding Prophecy

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Blessed (*makários* – having the favor of God, being in a state marked by the fullness of God) is he who (1) reads and those who (2) hear the words of this prophecy, and (3) keep those things which are written in it; (why) for the time is near.

Revelation 1:3

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Let's look at a few from the Revelation.

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seven stars (1:16)

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Tips for Understanding Prophecy

seven stars (1:16) = seven angels (1:20)

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And if no symbol has a clear interpretation in the immediate context, look for it in the larger context.

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None are listed in one gospel account.

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For example, the church age was a mystery that was not yet revealed when Daniel wrote about the future (Eph. 3). And for this reason, some Old Testament prophets sometimes blend the two comings of Christ.
