Imputed Righteousness

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This imputed righteousness is the whole of our justification before God.

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In Matthew, the phrase "kingdom of heaven" often refers to the kingdom Jesus establishes when He returns in glory to rule and reign for 1,000 years on the earth.

But it can also mean the kingdom of His righteousness, the eternal kingdom promised to those who have placed their faith and trust in Him and have been "born again" to reflect His nature.

What does Jesus mean when He says, "you will by no means enter the kingdom of heaven"?

"Assuredly, I say to you, unless you are converted (to turn around, to turn from one course of conduct to another) and become as little children, you will by no means enter the kingdom of heaven."

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When Jesus uses the phrase "kingdom of heaven" in this context, He is talking about eternal life with Him in heaven. Without the righteousness only Christ can give, there is no eternal life in Him.

Literally, you will not enter heaven after death.
